## FACTS ON THE PRIVATE ADOPTION AGENCY REIMBURSEMENT PROGRAM (PAARP)

- FACT: The County Welfare Directors Association states that, "Non-Profit Private Adoption Agencies provide a vital service to ensure children that have high needs find a permanent home with a loving family that is able and willing to care for them." (County Welfare Directors Association of California, Letter of Support, April 6, 2007)
- > FACT: California has <u>54,450</u> children who could grow up in long-term foster care if not adopted. (Source: CDSS Adoptions Program Annual Statistical Report)
- FACT: Only 7,103 children from foster care were adopted in the past year. (Source: CDSS Adoptions Program Annual Statistical Report)
- FACT: Non-Profit Private Adoption Agencies finalized 31% of all foster care adoptions in the past year, over 2,200. (Source: CDSS Budget Estimate, November 2006 Subvention)
- FACT: If the PAARP payment were increased from \$5,000 to \$10,000, the number of adoptions of foster children finalized by Non-Profit Private Adoption Agencies would increase. (California Alliance of Child and Family Services Survey, April 2007)
- **FACT**: The federal government pays for 47% of the cost of PAARP. Increasing the PAARP payment from \$5,000 up to an average of \$10,000 will only cost the state an additional \$2,650 per adoption because the state's share is only 53%. (Source: CDSS Budget Estimate, November 2006 Subvention)
- FACT: PAARP is the only <u>funding mechanism linked to outcome performance</u> in Child Welfare Services. Payment is made only after a successful placement and adoption. (<u>Source: CDSS</u>)
- FACT: Non-Profit Private Adoption Agencies <u>are losing</u> on average \$5,000 per adoption of foster children. NO NEW AGENCIES are opting to handle adoptions of foster children. (<u>California Alliance of Child and Family Services Adoption Agency Members</u>, 2007)
- FACT: According to CDSS, there have been <u>no new applications</u> to participate in the PAARP program in the past three years and five agencies have dropped out in the past year. There were 50 agencies participating in 2005-2006 and now there are only 45. (Source: CDSS Financial Service Bureau)
- FACT: Existing Non-Profit Private Adoption Agencies want to finalize more adoptions but they are limited in their growth. They cannot expand in an area that loses large amounts of money with each adoption. There is a limit to how much private funds can be raised to make up the gap. (Source: California Alliance of Child and Family Services Adoption Agency Members, 2007)
- FACT: The PAARP payment has not been increased in seven years and during that time, recruitment of foster families and facility costs have increased dramatically. (Source: California Statute, Welfare and Institutions Code 16122 and CNI Index)
- FACT: Children who would otherwise remain in long-term foster care who are adopted "achieve a substantial savings to the state in foster care costs." (Source: California Statute, Welfare and Institutions Code 16122)
